Message from the Board Chair and President and CEO

Founded in 1949, SOS Children's Villages began with one main goal: to protect abandoned, abused and neglected children and provide them with safe, loving homes. Today, 75 years later, we are the world's largest non-governmental organization focused on supporting children and young people without parental care, or at risk of losing it. Protecting children and their rights in everything we do is always our priority.

SOS Children's Villages envisions a world where every child grows up in a nurturing family with the love, respect, and security they need to thrive. We build families for children in need, help them shape their own futures, and share in the development of their communities – a mission that SOS Children's Villages Canada has proudly supported with Canadians since 1969.

As millions continued to struggle from ongoing overlapping crises and devastating inflation, 2023 did not relent and brought with it new challenges and increased hardships for vulnerable children and families. But despite this, people in Canada and around the world continued to step up and we increased our impact by 17% reaching nearly 3 million people through our programs in over 130 countries and territories.

The need for our work, however, also increased. New and existing violent conflicts, natural disasters, and the destructive effects of climate change persisted, and we responded to 32 crises in 38 countries with humanitarian action last year. Drought, famine, and disease outbreaks required us to more than double our efforts through our health programs to provide care to over 650,000 people.

Thanks to your support, we were there to protect children and families through the worst moments in their lives. We provided a lifeline through the traumas of war in Israel and Palestine, Sudan and Ukraine. We offered hope and access to vital care to ease suffering during the drought in the Horn of Africa and the earthquake in Morocco.

We also saw many positive, lasting impacts of our work. With the support of Canadian partners and donors, SOS Children's Villages Canada invested in the future to help ensure sustainable programs support globally. Some highlights of the many impacts of these investments and partnerships you will find throughout this report, including SOS Children's Villages Dominican Republic's programs expansion to the province of Barahona and SOS Children's Villages Namibia's new gardening project where food is grown to feed 600 primary school children.

None of this would be possible without you. This annual report shows a small glimpse of what we've achieved together.

To all our supporters – from donors, community fundraisers, institutional and corporate partners, to everyone who supported us with their time, voice, expertise and more – we give our sincerest thanks for the impact you have made in the lives of children, families, and communities around the world.

As we look ahead, we are forever inspired by the compassion, resilience, and determination of everyone we work with and for. While our work remains critical, we will continue to learn from and strengthen our programs to reach more people, keep children safe, and invest in our future.

In closing, we would also like to extend our deepest gratitude to two departing members of SOS Children's Villages Canada's Board of Directors: Past Board Chair and Board Member for over a decade, Alfred Page, and Board Member, Diamond Lalani. It was an honour to have been supported by your leadership and expertise.

What we do

SOS Children's Villages envisions a world where every child grows up in a nurturing family with the love, respect, and security they need to thrive. We take a holistic, child-centred approach to help children, families, and communities succeed in the long term. We strengthen families to prevent child abandonment, provide loving homes for children who lack parental care, educate and empower children to reach their full potential and advocate for children's rights so their voices can be heard.

1 Protect children:

We ensure that all children have a loving family environment and an opportunity to reach their full potential.

7 Advocate for children's rights:

We campaign with children to remove the barriers that prevent them from realizing their rights.

6 Boost economic empowerment:

We empower young people and parents through vocational and leadership training so they can break the cycle of poverty and become resilient.

5 Respond to emergencies:

We support those most affected during disasters and emergencies, focusing primarily on child protection and distributing life-saving aid to children and families.



2 Strengthen families:

We keep families together through our Family Strengthening Programs, which help parents and their communities protect and care for their children.

3 Increase access to education:

We provide quality education to children and young people and ensure schools are places where all students are safe and happy.

4 Ensure health for all:

We support health facilities and train frontline health workers so children and young people have access to mental and physical healthcare.

Protecting children and their rights in everything we do is always our priority.

SOS Children's Villages, founded in 1949, is the world's largest non-governmental organization focused on supporting children and young people without parental care, or at risk of losing it. Protecting children is at the heart of what we do, and today children around the world are in greater need of our support than ever before.

In 2023, the persistent onslaught of new and existing conflicts, natural disasters, droughts and famine continued to devastate hundreds of millions of people; but it's children who suffer the most. For the children living in conflict-affected areas, the situation is even more dire. Over 43 million children have been displaced from their homes – the highest number the world has ever seen and it's increasing every day.

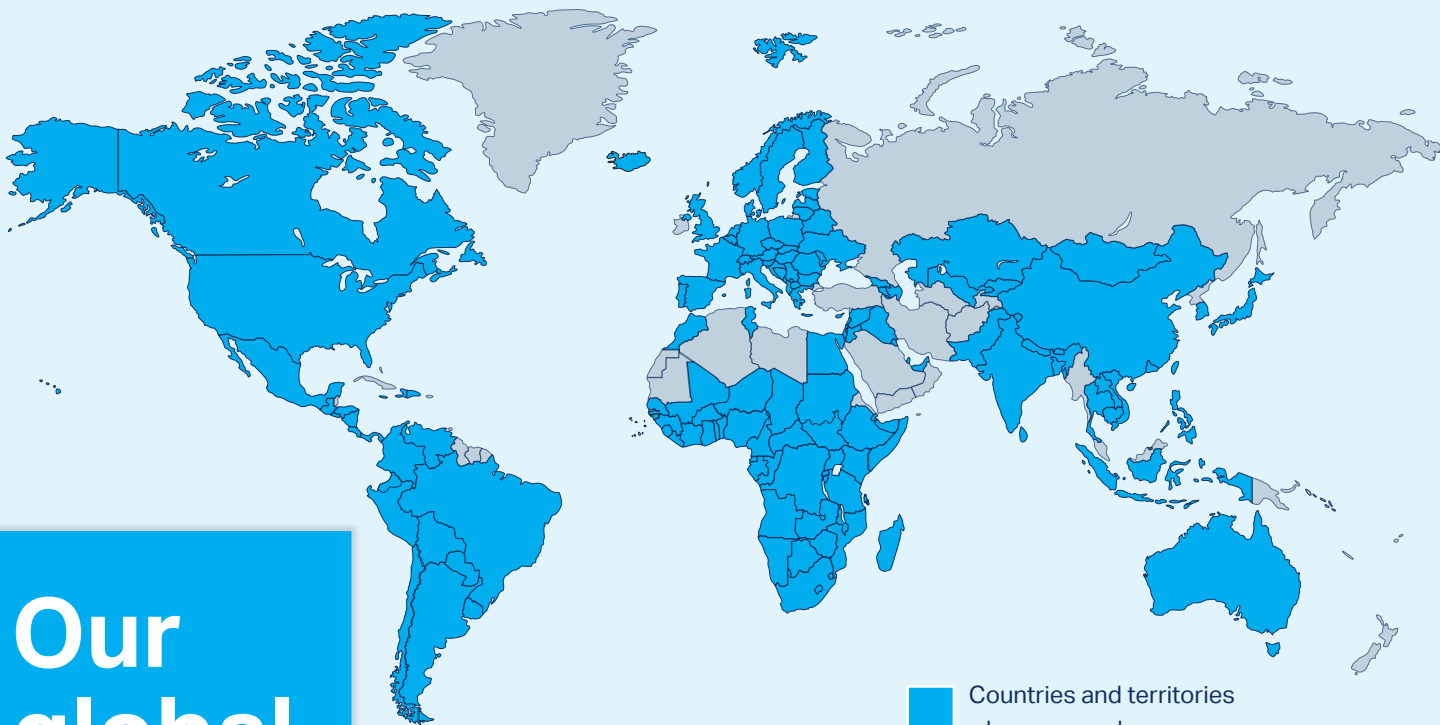

Programs highlights that Canadians have helped support in 2023

▶ Colombia

SOS Children's Villages implemented a community-strengthening strategy to protect children, adolescents, and their families affected by the Colombian armed conflict in the most vulnerable rural and urban zones of the Pacific Coast: Quibdó and Tumaco. The project supported more than 400 people and targeted families with children at high risk of being recruited by armed groups or criminal gangs.

▶ Dominican Republic

SOS Children's Villages expanded its programming to the province of Barahona in the southwestern part of the country. In close collaboration with community leaders and local partners, we are focused on supporting vulnerable children, youth and their families to ensure children's rights are respected and fulfilled. Thanks to your support, SOS Children's Villages also provides family-based care for 90 children and youth in Los Mina.

▶ Ethiopia

In Keranyo, SOS Children's Villages provided 194 children with early child development services, empowering caregivers to pursue education or employment knowing their children are safe and cared for. At the SOS Early Child Development Centre, we offered free holistic childcare services, including health and nutrition care and foundational education in math and Amharic, the local Ethiopian language.

▶ Ghana

We supported the SOS Children's Villages youth employment and entrepreneurship program in Accra, supporting six youths ages 18-35 to create a business by providing start-up funds, business development sessions and coaching. This program targets youth at risk of losing their caregiver, helping them become financially independent and keep their families together.

▶ Namibia

To promote access to primary education, SOS Children's Villages helped to establish a community gardening project for a primary school in Windhoek. Through the gardening project, food is grown to support a school feeding program for 600 children. Surplus produce is sold to reinvest in the continued operation of the community garden. SOS Children's Villages also provides, with your support, 160 children and youth who've lost parental care with safe and nurturing family-based care in Ondangwa and Windhoek.

▶ Nepal

In Jarahi, Ghodaghodi Municipality, 81 families participated in the SOS Family Strengthening Program which supported caregivers with income-generating activities, including farming initiatives. Families learned how to be self-reliant and establish strong relationships with local financial cooperatives and government agencies to access loans, subsidies and support services. In 2024, the program will expand into Manikapur.

▶ Pakistan

The SOS Technical Training Institute (SOS TTI) in Karachi provides disadvantaged youth, especially women and refugees, access to vocational training in technical fields empowering them to find meaningful employment and become independent. In 2023, 1,024 students graduated from SOS TTI programs, including 50 Afghan refugees

▶ Somalia

The increased humanitarian needs in Somalia surpassed the storage capacity of the SOS central warehouse where most health and nutrition supplies used by SOS Children's Villages were stored. A new humanitarian supplies warehouse was constructed in Mogadishu benefitting 400,000 people yearly.

▶ Ukraine

SOS Children's Villages provided educational support to 2,481 refugee Ukrainian children who had been forced to flee to Hungary and Romania due to the war. These children were provided with the materials needed to enrol in primary or secondary school, such as notebooks, manuals, and pens; and for those pursuing their education online, tablets and headphones.



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Alternative Care

We will not stop until every child has a loving, safe environment where they can grow and thrive.

All children have the right to grow up in a safe environment even when their own families cannot care for them. SOS Children's Villages works with communities and states to provide a loving and supportive family environment for children who need alternative care.

Our priority is to strengthen existing families so they can stay together. However, when this is not in the child's best interest or when there is no family to care for them, we offer a range of reliable care options, adapted to the local context, to best meet the individual needs of the child or young person.



SOS family care (our SOS Village Model): For 75 years, we have been providing children with family-based care in SOS families. Children and young people are nurtured by a reliable caregiver – an SOS parent – while living in a supportive home and community.



Foster care: Foster care differs from country to country, so our role changes too. In some cases, we provide support services to foster families, such as counselling or training, or we work with governments to implement quality foster care through sharing our expertise or assisting in the development and distribution of quality training materials.



Short-term care: When children need temporary care – for example, in an emergency – we provide an environment that protects them from harm in our transit homes. If it is determined that it is in the child's best interest to return to their family of origin, we facilitate and support this process. If not, we work with child protection authorities to find the most appropriate care option.

Forging bonds in the Dominican Republic that last a lifetime



When he was four years old, Robinson and his two brothers arrived at SOS Children's Villages in Los Mina, a safe and loving place where their worries of the past could fade away.

Robinson reflects, "My first day at the village was amazing. My first reaction was, 'WOW!' I was surprised by the space and seeing so many children." Feeling welcomed, they were given more than a nice room; it was a home, a place to belong and be loved.

Strong bonds were forged from the beginning with his SOS family and mother. Robinson arrived with two biological siblings but gained 'hundreds of brothers [and sisters] and friends at the same time.' Together, they laughed, played, and explored the world around them. There was never a dull moment.

Beyond nurturing his emotional wellbeing, SOS Children's Villages provided Robinson with ongoing support with his education, offering a pathway to self-sufficiency. With access to technical training, he gained the skills necessary to thrive beyond the village. The SOS economic empowerment and youth employment programs helped him secure an internship in hospitality that eventually led to a paid position.

Throughout his journey, Robinson remained connected to his sponsors, sharing updates on his progress and achievements, thankful for their unwavering support. Sponsorship means a lot as it provides children with opportunities they wouldn't otherwise have.

Now living independently, Robinson fervently desires every child to experience the same care and encouragement he received.

"To welcome a child and provide them with an education and a loving home was the miracle I needed [and SOS Children's Villages was there] just when I needed it."



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Happy childhood memories with SOS Children's Villages Namibia

Although too young to remember the traumatic events that led to the loss of both her parents, Josefina's first memories at SOS Children's Villages remain vivid. Clinging to her sister, she grappled with questions amid the unfamiliarity of a new home, wondering why they were there and where their parents had gone.

"We were treated well inside and outside the SOS Village. We received the best education and good healthcare."

As she grew older, she participated in school activities, played netball and took art classes. On weekends, the children were kept busy with activities like going to the swimming pool and visiting museums. Grateful for her sponsors' support, Josefina also cherished her time communicating with them.

"I liked belonging to a large family. I loved my SOS family and the moms who shared their precious time with us. I never slept hungry or was on the streets. We had no worries about anything." Holiday trips, movie nights, talent shows, dances and meals together strengthened their family bonds, and they loved each other. Josefina is now 38 years old, is the proud mother of three beautiful children, and is teaching them the values her SOS family instilled in her.

"I'm grateful to have lived the important stages of my life at SOS Children's Villages because, without all the love and support, I would not be the person I am today. I got the best of everything, and we called our SOS mothers 'mom'. Their love stays forever in our hearts, and our bond will never be broken."



Health

Every child has the right to survive and thrive. Our medical teams provide a wide range of critical health services, reducing child and maternal mortality and helping prevent child-family separation.

We know that access to healthcare is essential to our wellbeing. However, access to essential health services, such as mental health and sexual and reproductive health services, in many parts of the world is extremely limited and can have long-term negative health impacts on children and their caregivers.

SOS Children's Villages medical facilities and public health promotion programs ensure that children and their caregivers have access to the health information and services they need to thrive, primarily focusing on maternal and child health, mental health, sexual and reproductive health.

With your support, we more than doubled our impact in 2023 and cared for 654,600 children and their families through our health programs.



Supporting the development of skilled healthcare workers in Somalia

Somalia has one of the highest rates of maternal and infant mortality in the world. Each year, thousands of women and children die of largely preventable illnesses and medical complications due to a lack of access to essential healthcare services. One of the major barriers preventing women and children from getting the healthcare they need is a severe lack of skilled healthcare workers. Somalia only has four healthcare workers (doctor, nurse, or midwife) for every 10,000 people – the world’s lowest patient-to-healthcare worker ratio.

In 2002 in Mogadishu, SOS Children’s Villages established the SOS Community Nursing College, now named the SOS College of Health Sciences, to improve the overall health and wellbeing of the Somali population by training and certifying skilled health professionals. For over 20 years, the college has trained highly skilled nurses, midwives, community health workers and community nutrition workers who received accreditation

from Somalia’s federal Ministry of Health upon graduation. The college is a centre of excellence in training and developing skilled healthcare workers in Somalia.

The courses offered are tailored to help healthcare workers better respond to the healthcare needs of the Somali population and include training on emergency obstetric and newborn care, childhood illnesses and acute malnutrition, immunization, prevention of mother-to-child HIV transmission, emergency triage, infant and young child feeding, and maternal nutrition.

Over the past decade, the number of students enrolling in the college has more than doubled. To address the needs of the growing number of students and keep up with modern teaching methods, SOS Children’s Villages has invested in renovating and expanding the college facilities to ensure sufficient space and resources for all students.



- Existing classrooms have been renovated to ensure proper seating space, ventilation, and lighting.
- The college's skills laboratory, which provides a comprehensive learning environment to students who engage in practical individual or group activities, such as case study analysis and discussions, has been modernized.
- New and additional training equipment was purchased. This equipment will be key to providing students with high-fidelity healthcare simulations that mimic real situations, improving their decision-making and clinical skills through hands-on practice.
- Medical equipment purchased includes an auscultation manikin, an airway management model, a hospital bed, catheterization training simulators for men and women, advanced trauma accessories, and a CPR and AED training manikin.

In 2023, 110 students were enrolled and an additional 500 health professionals attended capacity-building courses provided by the college. Over the next five years, more than 2,685 healthcare workers are expected to benefit from programs at the SOS College of Health Sciences.

The renovation and expansion of the SOS College of Health Sciences was made possible thanks to the generous contributions of partners such as the Ptarmigan Charitable Foundation.

Education

From early childhood education to post-secondary opportunities, we are ensuring children and young people can realize their right to quality education despite conflict and crisis.

Violent conflicts, natural disasters, and climate change are just a few of the crises affecting children's access to education around the world with 250 million children and youth out of school and at risk of never returning. Millions more living in conflict-affected countries and territories, such as Ethiopia, Gaza, Sudan, Ukraine and Venezuela, face additional challenges that prevent them from accessing education altogether and unprecedented numbers of children and families have been displaced from their homes.

We run 575 educational programs worldwide, including SOS kindergartens, schools, and vocational training centres. In response to the overlapping and cumulative challenges of 2023, we enhanced programs to reach more children in SOS Villages, local communities, and child-friendly spaces.

We know that children who do not finish their education can become trapped in a cycle of poverty. That is why we promote high-quality, child-centred education, invest in teachers, and support the improvement of schools.

From preschool through to post-secondary, our educational opportunities give children and young people a sense of hope and allow them to be active agents in their learning and development process.

Paving pathways to brighter futures with the Green Family Education Fund



Unemployment among young people in Namibia is very high at over 40%. In recent years, this rate has been increasing partly due to the lingering economic effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

One of the driving forces behind such high unemployment rates is a lack of access to quality education. Around 50% of Namibian children complete their secondary school education and even fewer have access to higher levels of education and advanced skills training.

Children who have lost parental care or are at risk of losing parental care face added barriers to quality education, leading to higher dropout and lower attendance rates than their peers.

In 2016, with generous support from the Green Family Foundation, SOS Children's Villages launched the Green Family Education Fund. The fund provides critical financial assistance to help disadvantaged youth from Ondangwa in northern Namibia to access post-secondary education.

The fund covers the costs of tuition, accommodation, living expenses, and school materials. More than 35 youth have benefitted from the fund since launch, including 18 in 2023.

Students supported by the Green Family Education Fund study in high-demand industries, such as nursing, welding, and electrical engineering, leading to a high employment rate among program graduates.

Education offers hope and transforms lives in Namibia

In 2010, Reinhold and his siblings found a new home and family at SOS Children's Villages when their mother could no longer care for them. It was a turning point in their lives.

"Our [SOS Children's Villages] mother is a hardworking and loving person. She encourages us to study, and I'm studying very hard, which is why I love my mom very much." He explains that his favourite subject at school is biology, as he loves to learn about nature and the interaction between humans and animals. He aspires to be a zoologist and contribute to the wellbeing of animals, as they, too, need love and care to have a good life.

Growing up at SOS Children's Villages shaped him into a better person. Reinhold is grateful for the opportunities that have come his way and has made the most of them. If given the chance, he would establish a high-quality school in the village where he was born to provide education and guidance to all the children there, just like he received at SOS Children's Villages, and inspire them to dream big.

Reinhold is grateful for the path that led him and his siblings to SOS Children's Villages, their SOS family, and the prospect of bright futures.

Economic Empowerment

With strong families, children and young people can get the care they need to thrive. We offer tailored support to strengthen vulnerable families, helping to keep them together.

SOS Children's Villages has been a global leader in strengthening families and preventing child abandonment for 75 years. Every child needs someone to support them as they grow, but many parents face hardships that prevent them from providing proper care. The direct and indirect effects of extreme poverty can also deprive children of the care they need to thrive. With generous supporters like you, we create reliable, long-term economic solutions so families can stay together and beat poverty for good.

Economic empowerment helps children reach their full potential, advancing gender equality and sustainable development. Our SOS Family Strengthening Program model enhances the employability of parents and caregivers through skills training, cash assistance, and support in establishing small businesses and finding decent work. We focus on the most vulnerable and marginalized families – predominately single female caregivers.

Boosting women's control over household income brings significant positive impacts to their families and communities. When women are empowered to participate fully in the economy, women's voices are heard, and their children's access to school and healthcare improves. Through self-confidence and leadership skills training, we work with women so they can access better quality work and make their own business decisions. We also reduce other barriers that prevent women from entering the workforce, such as a lack of childcare options.

In 2023, we strengthened 103,500 families, reaching 549,800 children, youth, and adults with your support.

Empowering women and strengthening families and communities in Ethiopia



SOS Children's Villages Ethiopia established the Family and Community Strengthening Program in Keranyo, a deeply impoverished community on the outskirts of Addis Ababa, the capital. In collaboration with community members, which includes community leaders, migrant families, women's groups, community-based organizations and informal leaders, this initiative aims to improve the overall wellbeing of vulnerable children while socially and economically empowering vulnerable single mothers and other marginalized female caregivers, enabling them to sustainably meet their families' needs.

The work focuses on three action areas:

- Increasing the use of comprehensive early child development services, making them more accessible, and empowering caregivers to pursue education or employment during the day by offering free holistic childcare services such as health and nutrition care at an SOS Early Child Development Centre.
- Improving parental care for vulnerable children by empowering women with skills development and business training.
- Enhancing the safety of women and children in the community by strengthening the capacity of community-based organizations to prevent and respond to rights violations, including sexual and gender-based violence.

Approximately 200 women, 194 children and a dozen community partners, including schools, community-based organizations, government institutions and a child protection committee, participate in the program annually.

The Family and Community Strengthening Program continues to provide support to vulnerable children and families thanks to generous contributions from partners such as Unifor.

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Emergency Response

We work around the world to help children who are affected by conflict and disasters, separated from their families, and who have had to flee their homes.

Protecting children in crisis is at the heart of what we do. In an emergency, children are always the most vulnerable. SOS Children's Villages helps children and families in emergencies get the support they need to survive and build resilience for years to come.

Since 1949, we have responded to more than 250 humanitarian situations worldwide. We specialize in the protection and care of children, working with unaccompanied and separated children, reuniting families, and ensuring children receive the support they need to recover. To protect children and prevent family separation during humanitarian emergencies, our local teams and partners provide life-saving healthcare, nutrition, clean water, shelter, and education to those who need it most.

We stepped up our humanitarian efforts in 2023 to aid more than 1,385,800 people in crisis and protect children and families against the impacts of extreme conflicts, climate change, and natural disasters.

In 2023, your generous support of our emergency response programs helped provide immediate, life-saving aid to children and their families in Israel and Palestine, Morocco, Sudan, and Ukraine.

Colombia's response to Venezuela crisis

Colombia remains the fourth biggest refugee-hosting country in the world, hosting nearly 3 million Venezuelan refugees and migrants. Since 2018, SOS Children's Villages Colombia has provided emergency assistance to more than 120,000 Venezuelan refugees and migrants. In 2023, this work continued in some of Colombia's most vulnerable communities and included activities focused on protection, education, shelter, early recovery, and emergency distribution of food and other items.

Ethiopia

Climate-related disasters and conflicts in different regions of the country have created a widespread humanitarian crisis. According to UN reports, over 21 million Ethiopians, including 12 million children, need urgent humanitarian assistance. SOS Children's Villages is responding to the urgent humanitarian needs of children and families affected by the crisis, by providing protection, healthcare, WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene), and multi-purpose cash assistance.

Israel and Palestine

On October 7, Palestinian armed groups crossed into Israel, along with rocket attacks, resulting in civilian casualties, the capture of civilians and members of the Israeli forces, and the devastation of residential areas. On October 8, the Israeli Government declared a state of war. These events resulted in a catastrophic humanitarian crisis, especially for children. SOS Children's Villages is responding to the urgent humanitarian needs of children and their caregivers in Gaza, Israel, and the West Bank. A primary element of our response has been the protection of unaccompanied and separated children, as well as children in alternative care.

Somalia

In 2023, Somalia was on the brink of widespread famine and experienced catastrophic droughts followed by mass flooding. Combined with conflict and disease outbreaks, the humanitarian crisis in Somalia left over 8 million people in urgent need of aid, including 5.1 million children. SOS Children's Villages responded by providing access to essential healthcare and nutritional assistance.

Sudan

On April 15, a civil war erupted in Sudan between the Sudanese Armed Forces and the Rapid Support Forces. Despite being one of the world's most catastrophic disasters, it has remained widely overlooked. Soaring hunger and the largest child displacement crisis leaves 14 million children, half of all Sudanese children, in need of urgent humanitarian aid. In 2023, SOS Children's Villages launched a humanitarian response program to provide cash assistance, hygiene kits, mental health support, and child-friendly spaces.

Ukraine

The lives and wellbeing of children in Ukraine remain under threat due to the ongoing war. Despite the fragile operating context, SOS Children's Villages and its partners maintained a presence in 16 regions of the country. In total, 246,251 Ukrainians were supported by the emergency response, including 148,418 children. These children and their families benefitted from mental health and psychosocial support from mobile or static teams, physical healthcare and physical rehabilitation services, legal support, cash-based assistance, educational support, emergency food assistance and hygiene materials.

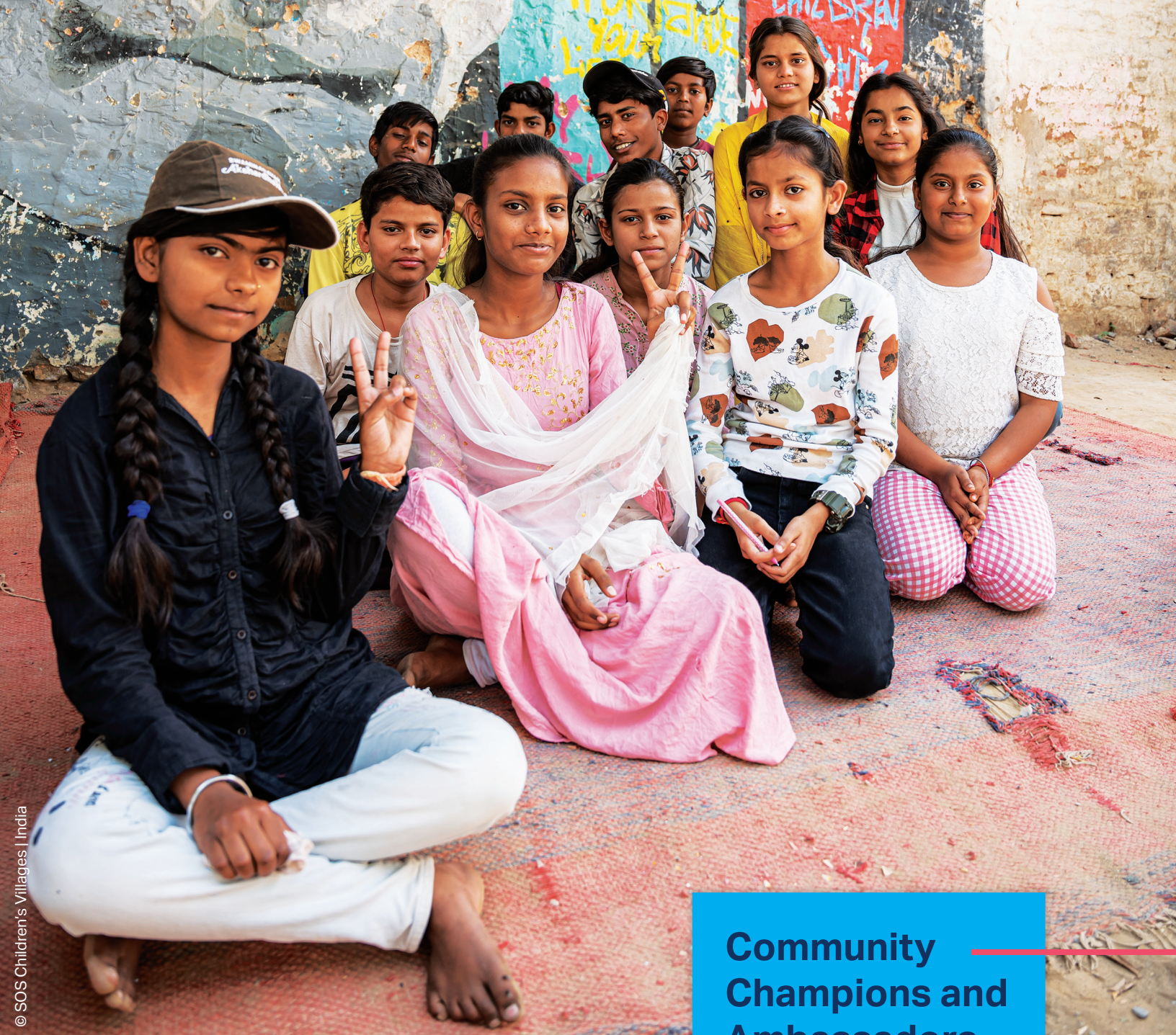

The *Empowering Adolescent Girls in Costa Rica* program helps vulnerable teenage girls, including those who have lost parental care, with educational and youth-friendly workshops aimed at strengthening their understanding of their rights, sexual and reproductive health matters, and gender-based violence.

The *United Families* program in Los Mina, Dominican Republic, supports vulnerable mothers, especially teenage mothers and women-headed households, to prevent the crisis that leads to child abandonment and abuse by providing individualized support and skills development opportunities.

The *Girls Take the Lead* program in Nicaragua contributes to the empowerment of girls and adolescents and the creation of safe and protective environments in Jinotega, Managua and Juigalpa by hosting workshops for teenagers and sensitizing caregivers and local authorities on gender issues affecting adolescent girls, such as violence.

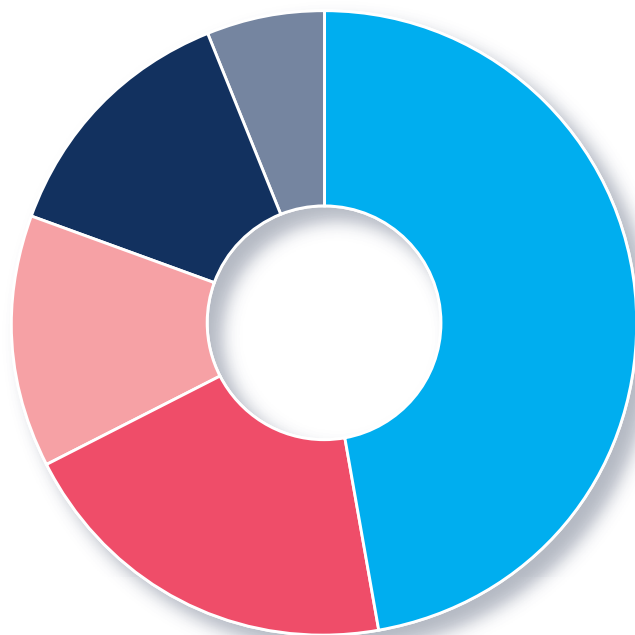

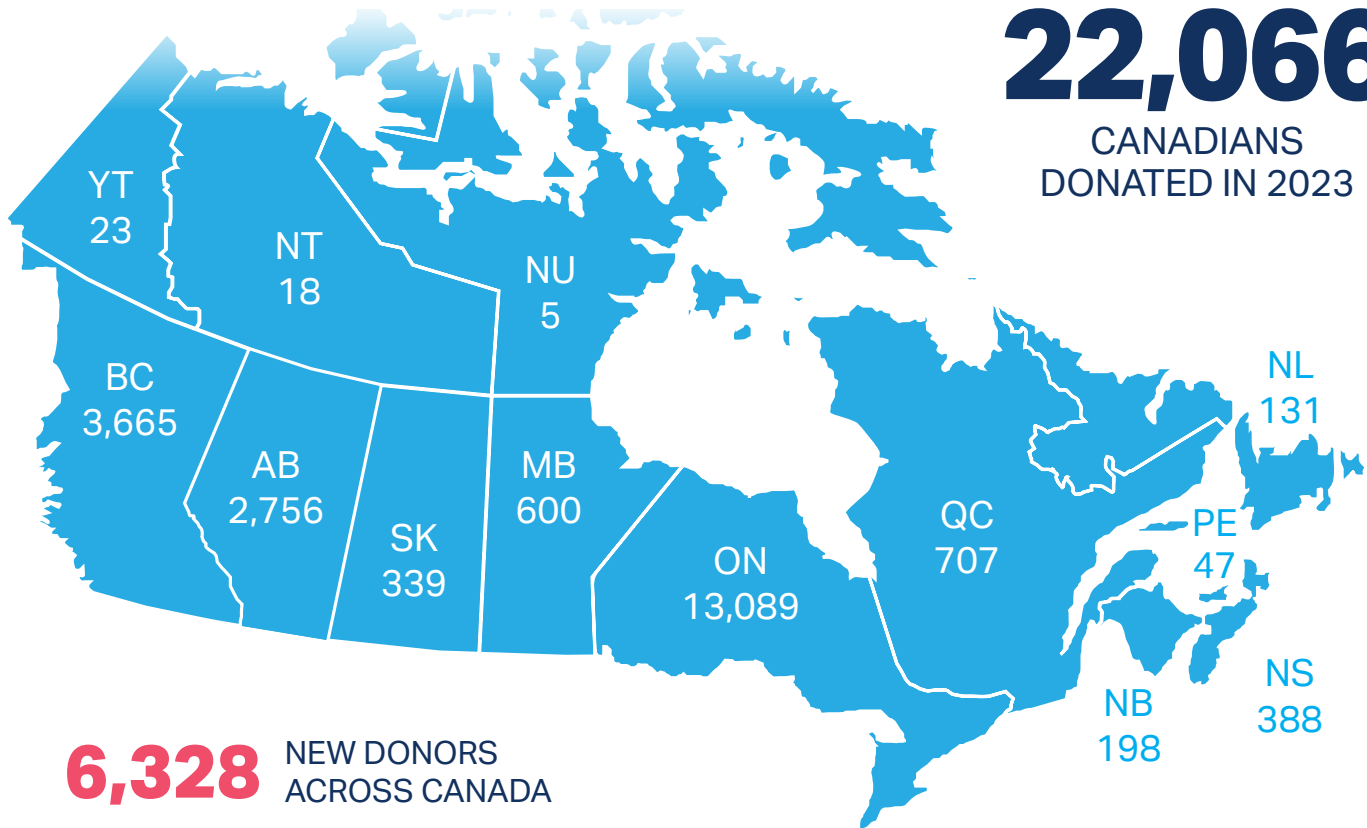
***A Message from our President and CEO Thomas Bauer and Board of Directors Treasurer Phil Hopwood**
